An act to add Section 71453 to the Public Resources Code, relating to environmental protection.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2285, as introduced, Rendon. Environmental protection: 30x30 goal: urban nature-based investments: parity.

By Executive Order No. N-82-20, Governor Gavin Newsom directed the Natural Resources Agency to combat the biodiversity and climate crises by, among other things, establishing the California Biodiversity Collaborative and conserving at least 30% of the state's lands and coastal waters by 2030. Existing law requires the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency to prepare and submit, on or before March 31, 2024, and annually thereafter, a report to the Legislature on the progress made in the prior calendar year toward achieving the goal to conserve 30% of California's lands and coastal waters by 2030. Existing law provides that it is the goal of the state to conserve at least 30% of California's lands and coastal waters by 2030, known as the 30x30 goal.

This bill would encourage the Governor's office, state agencies, and the Legislature, when distributing resources towards conservation and restoration goals during future budgetary deliberations, to ensure parity in allocations toward urban nature-based investments. The bill would require state funding agencies, including certain state conservancies and the Wildlife Conservation Board, when programming and awarding funds to revise, modify, or amend guidelines as necessary to meet the

30x30 goal, to allow for urban nature-based projects on degraded lands to be eligible and competitive for state funds.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. (a) The Legislature finds and declares all of the 2 following:

(1) Executive Order No. N-82-20 by Governor Gavin Newsom
directs the Natural Resources Agency to combat the biodiversity
and climate crises by, among other things, establishing the
California Biodiversity Collaborative and conserving at least 30
percent of California's lands and coastal waters by 2030, known
as the 30x30 goal.

9 (2) Hundreds of millions of dollars in General Fund allocations 10 have been directed to the Wildlife Conservation Board, the 11 Department of Conservation, and state conservancies, among 12 others, to meet the 30x30 goal.

(3) Governor Newsom and First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom
are championing the Outdoors for All initiative under the Natural
Resources Agency that, among other things, seeks to expand parks
in communities with little outdoor space and supports and
underwrites programs to connect people who lack access to green
space, fostering a sense of belonging and stewardship of the state's
outdoors.
(4) Senate Bill 337 (Chapter 392 of the Statutes of 2023) codifies

(5) The County of Los Angeles Department of Parks &
Recreation has piggybacked off the Governor's and First Partner's
work on the 30x30 goal and Outdoors for All and prepared the
2022 Parks Needs Assessment Plus (PNA+) that identifies areas
for Los Angeles-based environmental conservation and restoration

that form the basis of the 30x30 goal.

(6) PNA+ goes beyond traditional conservation models that involve the acquisition and protection of natural lands and reimagines the 30x30 goal through a more equity- and access-facing lens to direct funding and resources into the healing and conversion of blighted, degraded, and otherwise underutilized urban-based lands into green spaces and microhabitats promoting

nature-based opportunities, access, and enhanced community and
 neighborhood aesthetics.

3 (7) Through thorough analysis, PNA+ identifies possible green
4 space acquisition and restoration opportunities within the county
5 and reveals a sharp contrast among regions in the county.

6 (8) PNA+ discovered that most of the available land for 7 acquisition pursuant to the 30x30 goal was in the north County of 8 Los Angeles, an area already rich in park and open-space resources 9 as compared to the south County of Los Angeles, an area richer 10 in diversity and more challenged economically, wherein the 11 opportunities for 30x30 projects are confined to degraded and 12 underutilized lands.

(b) It is the intent of the Legislature to codify the priorities
identified in the November 2023 report of the Outdoors for All
initiative, "Providing Equitable Access to Parks and Nature," and
to encourage the Governor's administration and the Legislature,
when distributing resources towards conservation and restoration

18 goals during future budgetary deliberations, to ensure parity in

19 allocations toward urban nature-based investments.

20 (c) It is the intent of the Legislature to require state funding

21 entities, including, but not limited to, state conservancies and the

22 Wildlife Conservation Board, when programming and awarding

23 funds to revise, modify, or amend guidelines as necessary to meet

24 the 30x30 goal, to allow for urban nature-based projects on

25 degraded lands to be eligible and competitive for state funds.

SEC. 2. Section 71453 is added to the Public Resources Code,to read:

28 71453. (a) The Legislature finds and declares that the

8	schoolyards to fill gaps outside of school hours.
9	(G) Support connecting different sized outdoor spaces, including
10	statewide and regional trail networks, to provide diverse
11	experiences for all skill levels, with the cobenefit of creating
12	wildlife corridors.
13	(H) Ensure outdoor space development and management is
14	consistent with California's Climate Adaptation Strategy, Scoping
15	Plan, and Natural and Working Lands Climate Smart Strategy.

(I) Support implementation of antidisplacement measures to
 ensure access to open space does not lead to gentrification.

(J) Collaborate with private landowners and federal, state,
regional, and local governments to explore opportunities to expand
recreation access on private lands.

21 (2) Foster belonging. This priority includes strategies that:

(A) Share culturally diverse, relevant, and relatable stories and
images of California's people and history through the
programming, interpretive materials, art, and signage offered at
outdoor spaces, cultural and historic places, and museums.

(B) Foster public appreciation of, and connection to, California'snatural and cultural resources.

(C) Support improvements to language access for outdoor
 programming, educational materials, and staff at open spaces,
 cultural and historic places, and museums.

31 (D) Build trust between and among staff and visitors.

32 (E) Create adult and youth-centered programming, including
33 intergenerational opportunities, at outdoor spaces to inspire and
34 build confidence across a broad range of recreational users and
35 activities.

36 (F) Rename offensive and derogatory geographic features and
37 place names across outdoor spaces to address historical wrongs
38 and create safe and inclusive spaces.

39 (3) Connect people and the outdoors. This priority includes40 strategies that:

1 (A) Make information about California's parks and outdoor 2 spaces easier to find and understand.

3 (B) Explore opportunities to offer free broadband on state 4 recreation lands, and cultural and historic properties, allowing for 5 more accessible information, inclusive signage, programming, and 6 connectivity to address safety concerns.

7 (C) Enhance and create more green, accessible, safe, active, 8 public, and shared transportation options linking the outdoors and 9 communities.

(D) Explore ways to provide free access to California state parksfor low-income communities.

- (E) Support tribal members in harvesting culturally significantmaterials in outdoor spaces.
- (F) Explore public-private partnerships to support gear librariesand low-cost outings and classes at outdoor spaces.
- 16 (G) Prioritize funding and a streamlined process for building17 lower cost coastal accommodations.

18 (H) Prioritize partnerships with nonprofits that provide youth 19 and families from underserved communities and people with 20 disabilities with access to state lands through supervised 21 programming.

- (4) Cocreate with communities. This priority includes strategiesthat:
- (A) Conduct early, often, and meaningful tribal consultationswith the goal of enhancing tribal partnerships and collaboration.

26 (B) Invite and embed meaningful tribal consultation and27 community engagement into grant processes.

(C) Update the grant applications of the Natural Resources
Agency and its departments to increase support and reduce barriers
for underserved communities, including California Native
American tribes, and the organizations that serve them.

32 (D) Collaborate with other agencies to build best practices for 33 public meetings that are accessible to people with disabilities and 34 increase involvement by underserved communities through 35 language access and greater transparency about state processes.

(E) Collaborate with the Governor's office to enhance outreach
 efforts for appointed positions on Natural Resources Agency boards

38 and commissions to increase community representation.

1 (F) Identify opportunities for tribal governments and 2 community-based organizations to cocreate and comanage parks 3 and outdoor spaces.

4 (G) Continue to grow the Natural Resources Agency's capacity 5 to meaningfully engage underserved communities.

6 (5) Build equitable career pathways and a representative 7 workforce. This priority includes strategies that:

8 (A) Bridge internship, conservation corps, and other career9 development programs to careers with the state.

(B) Enhance strategies and inclusive career outreach and
 programming through dedicated staff at the Natural Resources
 Agency's career center.

(C) Continue coordination of intra-agency workgroups and the
 Department of Human Resources to reassess job classifications,
 hiring processes, and salary ranges.

(D) Continue coordination efforts of intra-agency workgroups
 to develop career pathways strategies to support aligned efforts in
 employee retention.

(6) Align funding to achieve Outdoors for All. This priorityincludes strategies that:

(A) Develop and communicate an inventory of equitable accessinvestments and impact.

23 (B) Prioritize resource efficiency and reduce redundancies.

24 (C) Establish partnerships with philanthropic and for-profit 25 sectors.

26 (D) Align existing funding sources to create multibenefit projects27 and programs.

(E) Streamline standards and decisionmaking tools for equitableoutdoor access to determine strategic investments for the state.

30 (b) The Governor's office, state agencies, and the Legislature,

31 when distributing resources towards conservation and restoration

32 goals during future budgetary deliberations, are encouraged to

ensure parity in allocations toward urban nature-based investments.(c) State funding agencies, including, but not limited to, the

35 conservancies established pursuant to Sections 31100, 32320,

36 32510, 32555, 32602, 32633, 33200, and 33501 of this code and

37 Section 66906 of the Government Code and the Wildlife

38 Conservation Board, shall, when programming and awarding funds

39 to revise, modify, or amend guidelines as necessary to meet the
