

A MESSAGE FROM RABBI AARON MEYER

"It was a sunny day early in May [perhaps March] of 1922. My two grandmothers, rocking gently in chairs provided for their especial comfort in our house, communed in Yiddish. Their conversation was not intended for my ears, but since Grandma Rubin was slightly hard of hearing, and since both were moved by intense emotion, I could eavesdrop without any difficulty.

"In-law," said my mother's mother, "Talk to your son. Tell him not to do this thing!"

"Mahateineste (in-law)," said Grandmother Kaplan, "you know a son doesn't listen to his mother. You talk to your daughter. Tell her to tell him not to do this thing!"

And what was this terrible deed which my father was about to perform, and which they both sought uselessly to prevent? He was planning to present me in a public ceremony in synagogue as a bat mitzvah."

Thus begins Judith Kaplan Eisenstein's reflections on becoming the first Bat Mitzvah. Though she read from a Chumash rather than the Torah itself, and did so only after her father had completed the traditional reading, her actions opened the door for equality of women in Jewish ritual and life. "No thunder sounded, no lightning struck," she recalled. "The institution of Bat Mitzvah had been born without incident, and the rest of the day was all rejoicing." We are not entirely sure what prompted Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan, her father, to create this trailblazing opportunity. Perhaps the timing in American life was just right: the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified just two years earlier. As a rabbi and a father of four daughters, maybe he took seriously their Jewish upbringing and education. It could be that, as Judith writes, he simply believed firmly in the equality of women in Jewish life. Whatever his motivation, his leadership of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism in New York City and ideological foundation of what we now know as Reconstructionist Judaism changed the Jewish world for the better now 100 years ago.

Standing on her shoulders some 50 years later, Sally Priesand became the first woman ordained as a rabbi in the United States in 1972. She writes: "My parents gave me one of the greatest gifts a parent can give a child: the courage to dare and to dream. With their encouragement, I was able to remain focused on my goal, relatively unconcerned that no woman had ever been ordained rabbi by a theological seminary and determined to succeed despite the doubts I heard expressed in the organized Jewish community." The stained-glass ceiling was broken by another hero of modern Judaism, opening even more doors for the full inclusion of women in Jewish life.

Rabbi Sally Priesand, Judith Kaplan, and other pioneering women in Jewish life have helped ensure that a different set of life experiences, perspectives, and opinions are heard and valued when interpreting, teaching, and living Judaism. We are incredibly fortunate to live in an era when girls and women can see themselves reflected in the leadership of Judaism from an early age, yet there is clearly more work to be done to ensure not only the authority and safety of women in Jewish leadership but that we continue to expand the circle. We have ongoing obligation to ensure that the diversity of the Jewish community is reflected in Jewish leadership: men, women, and non-binary individuals of all abilities, orientations, racial backgrounds and more bring unique gifts to the Jewish people that strengthen Jewish life. Realizing this — and more importantly acting upon it — will be the true celebration and realization of the efforts of Judith Kaplan and Sally Priesand in this anniversary year.



Endowments – Securing Temple's Future

It is not an exaggeration to say that without our Endowment Funds, Temple Emanuel's financial present would be challenging. It is also not an exaggeration to say that without a concerted effort to better utilize and grow our Endowment Funds, Temple's financial future will be uncertain.

What is an Endowment Fund? According to the National Council of Nonprofits, endowments are "assets (usually cash accounts that are invested in equities or bonds, or other investment vehicles) set aside so that the original assets (known as the 'corpus') grow over time as a result of income earned from interest on the underlying invested funds." "The goal of most organizations with endowments is to allow the corpus to grow without withdrawals so that the underlying corpus increases in value over time, and the interest earned is available every year for the stated purpose of the endowment."

Temple Emanuel is blessed to have four separate Endowment Funds. One of the goals of Temple's Board this year is to focus on how together we can best utilize and grow these funds. At our December Board meeting, the Board voted to create an Endowments Committee, led by Treasurer Tracy Barnett, which is tasked with the purpose of fulfilling these goals.

So, what are Temple's Endowment Funds and how are they used?

Rabbi William Sajowitz Endowment Fund

The purpose of this Fund is "to enhance the cultural, educational, religious, social action and youth endeavors of the Temple and its members with emphasis on strengthening our commitment to the Reform Movement." This Fund provides approximately \$16,000 per year toward Temple programming, as well as scholarships for Jewish camps and trips to Israel.

Louise "Sissie" Sperling Endowment Fund

The purpose of this fund is to "supplement [Temple's] annual operating income." This is Temple's most flexible fund, as its yearly percentage can be spent on any aspect of Temple's budget. At this point, the Sperling Fund provides about \$15,000 per year towards our budget.

Diskin Music Fund

With tremendous gratitude to the Diskin family, this is Temple's largest Endowment Fund. Its purpose is the "development and/or continuation of the Temple's musical endeavors and activities, the cultivation and support of musical scholarship, the purchase and preservation of musical resources, the endowment of a musical directorship as well as other related musical appreciation opportunities which would enrich the Temple and enhance the relationship between the Temple and the South Hills community." The dollars available from this Fund have already blessed us with the ability to engage Temple's first-ever Student Cantor, and we are so excited to share with you updates in the coming months about efforts made to engage additional staff.

Life & Legacy Fund

For the last five years, a dedicated team at Temple Emanuel, led by Matt Schwartz, in partnership with the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh and the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, has been working to create Temple's newest endowment fund. At this point, approximately 40 members have pledged donations to this Fund.

Living Our Values at ECDC: The Chair Project

At ECDC our core values–*Hachnasat Orchim* (Welcoming), *Kehillah* (Community), *Kavod* (Respect), *Tzedakah* (Sharing), and *Simchat Limud* (Joy of Learning)--guide our daily work with the children. While these principles sometimes go unspoken, embedded into our pedagogy and approach, we often look for ways to allow the children to live these values in their work at school.

If you've entered Temple from the rear porch, you may have seen an example of *Hachnasat Orchim* in action. Our *Atelierista*, Michelle Dreyfuss, invited the children of ECDC



to participate in The Chair Project. Across our classrooms, children worked to paint and collage the chairs to create a welcoming seating area for visitors to Temple Emanuel and ECDC. Ms. Dreyfuss shared, "The mitzvah of welcoming guests is not just about inviting people in but also making them feel honored, relaxed, and at home. We often welcome friends by offering them a place to sit. The children were reminded how kind it is when we tap the chair next to us and invite a friend to sit next to us." An interfaith commemoration of the Holocaust co-sponsored by Duquesne University's Gumberg Library, and the Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh will take place online on Wednesday, January 26, at 6:30. Students from the Duquesne Hillel Jewish Students Organization will take part with Dr. Lauren Apter Bairnsfather, Director of the Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh, and Rabbi Hazzan Jeffrey Myers of the Tree of Life, and Rev. Bill Christy, Duquesne University Chaplain and Director of Campus Ministry.

The featured speaker will be Temple Emanuel member Dr. David Rosenberg, who will present The Making of 'Who is a Jew?': A Tale of Two Cities and the Challenges of Bringing a Troubling Holocaust History Home. The exhibit debuted at Temple Emanuel in 2017.

Dr. Rosenberg is the recipient of the Medal of Honor from the City of Amiens for his outstanding work on the history of the city and region. The Mayor of Amiens, Brigitte Fouré, and President of Amiens Métropole, Alain Gest, will present the award virtually on February 8, 2022, with an in-person celebration to follow when it is safe to travel.

An exhibition of Dr. Rosenberg's work will be on display in Gumberg Library from January 10 through February 4. The exhibition and commemoration program is free and open to the public, but registration is required for the program.

Congregational Code of Ethics



Applications for need-based college scholarships for the 2022-2023 school year are available from the Jewish Scholarship Service (JSS) of the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh. This program is administered by Jewish Family and Community Services. The funds are made available through the generosity of families who have established endowments through the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh, Jewish Community Center, National Council of Jewish Women, Jewish Women International of Pittsburgh (formerly B'nai B'rith Women), The Pittsburgh Foundation, and Rodef Shalom Congregation.

All scholarships are distributed on the basis of <u>demonstrated</u> financial need. Depending on the scholarship fund, other factors such as academic achievement, field of study, school attending, and Jewish and general community involvement will also be considered. In addition, the applicant must be Jewish, reside in Allegheny, Westmoreland, Beaver, Butler or Washington County for at least two years, and need financial assistance to attend an accredited institution of higher education as either an undergraduate or graduate student.
